The islands and archipelagos of northwestern Mexico are critically important for the conservation of many seabird species, such as: Top Left – Yellow-footed Gull (*Larus livens*), which breeds only in the Gulf of California; Top Right – Black-vented Shearwater (*Puffinus opisthomelas*), of which 95% of the global population breeds on Natividad Island; Bottom – Laysan Albatross (*Phoebastria immutabilis*) pictured here on Guadalupe Island, but it also nests farther south in the species only subtropical breeding colony in the world on the Revillagigedo Archipelago.
