## **Obituary**

Dr. Leslie A. Stauber, 65, of 485 South Randolphville Road, Piscataway, New Jersey, died suddenly on March 27, 1973.

Dr. Stauber retired last June after 37 years' service to Rutgers University. He was a professor of parasitology and served as chairman of the Department of Zoology from 1959 to 1964 and 1965 to 1967. He was president of the American Society of Parasitologists and vice-president of the National Shellfisheries Association.

Dr. Stauber received his undergraduate and master's degrees from Rutgers. After completing his doctoral studies at the University of Chicago in 1937, he did malaria research in Panama for four years. In 1935 he joined Rutgers to do research in the diseases of oysters.

His work appeared in more than 80 publications, many dealing with aspects of the tropical disease leishmaniasis, on which his work was internationally recognized.

He is survived by his wife, Mabel; two sons, Dr. William T. and T. Nelson; a daughter, Dr. Amy Law, and a grandson.

Contributions may be made to the Graduate Research Fund in Parasitology-Zoology established recently by Dr. Stauber himself. This fund is designed to assist graduate students in conducting parasitological research as part of their degree program.
